Glass tanks: incorrect tortoise housing



What happens while living in glass:

- Abnormal development many health problems and early death come from inadequate environmental conditions
- Stress and depression tortoises are active, curious creatures and glass confinement results in abnormal behaviors:
 - Stress constantly climbing the glass trying to get out
 - Depression hiding or giving up, no activity
- Stress and depression are the causes of many significant and permanent health problems

Why are glass tanks bad?

- Little to no air circulation acts as a sauna
- Cannot obtain or maintain correct temperatures
- Clear sides stresses out the tortoise
 - Tortoises don't understand a glass barrier; if they can see through it, they will try to get through it

If glass is bad, why does the pet industry advocate its use?

- Money the pet industry is focused on profit, not the well-being of animals
- · Glass is easy to make, cheap and profitable
